





CHEF

A mission-driven leader who sets the vision, skillfully mixes ingredients, uses various tools, and builds a team of specialists to bring it to life, providing direction and critique to ensure success.

COWBOY

A quiet caretaker who makes sure that everyone is safe, well supplied, and moving in the right direction.

TED TALKER

A passionate lecturer who imparts knowledge, sparks new ideas, and uses images and stories to engage a crowd.







COACH

A team leader who conveys strategy, pushes everyone to their full potential and leads "Monday morning" reflection.

THERAPIST

A one-on-one reflection guide who asks thoughtful questions, helps uncover connections, and celebrates breakthroughs.

SPY

A "Just-In-Time" advisor who asks questions to help someone interpret and appreciate what's in front of them, answers questions when they arise, and shares insight about backstory and meaning.
